

Continuous Program Improvement

Every year, in the springtime, program staff, Governing Board members, and parent representatives get together to plan the whole next school year. We call this process Strategic Planning.

The Strategic Planning Committee reviews all of the tools we use to assess how the program is doing, such as data from children's GOLD reports, results of the Parent Survey, results of the Staff Survey, minutes from Policy Council and other committee meetings, classroom and transportation safety checklists, and reports from site visits from Head Start and Colorado Preschool Program (CPP) specialists. We see what is going very well with the program and celebrate those successes. We also take an honest look at what can be improved and make plans defining goals and objectives that show the improvements we want to see.

The documentation for these plans to show our commitment to continuous program improvement are the <u>Strategic Plan</u> and the <u>Program</u> <u>Improvement Plan</u>. These reports are submitted as part of our grant applications and in compliance with the new Quality Rating Improvement System (QRIS), recently put in place by the Colorado Office of Early Childhood for all licensed child care centers.

Teaching your Child to Love Words

A child's journey towards literacy involves learning to speak, listen, read, understand, watch, draw and write. You can help your child develop these skills. Talking, singing, playing sound and word games, reading, writing and drawing with your child are great ways to establish a good literacy foundation. Everyday activities, like going to the local shops or library, as well as special treats – trips to the museum or zoo – all provide

Many parents feel they haven't got time for literacy development activities. You don't need lots of time — five minutes a few times a day is often enough. The key is to use different opportunities to help your child learn. These can range from things like taking a trip to the local store to a night-time story before bed.



<u>Talk and sing</u> - Talking and singing with children can teach them about sounds and how sounds come together to form language. By teaching your child language games and songs, you'll be helping him to develop listening and speaking skills. It's also important to listen to your child – this helps you learn about the stories and songs he most enjoys.

<u>Read and make books</u> - Reading with your child helps develop his vocabulary, ability to listen and comprehend, and **ability to understand the purpose of print. You'll also be helping** to set up a lifelong positive attitude towards reading.

<u>Draw and write</u> - From an early age, children love to try to 'write' like their older siblings or parents. Play-writing (scribble) and drawing helps your child develop the fine motor skills needed for writing with pencils and pens later. It also helps him begin to recognize and remember letter shapes.

<u>Hand Washing</u>

Good hand washing is the first line of defense against the spread of many illnesses — from the common cold to more serious infections, such as meningitis, bronchiolitis, the flu, hepatitis A, and most types of infectious diarrhea. Below are some suggestions on how to scrub those pesky germs away.

Washing Hands Correctly: Teach this routine to your kids — or better yet, wash your hands together often so they learn how important this good habit is.

Also, to minimize the germs passed around to your family, make regular hand washing a rule for everyone, especially:

- before eating and cooking
- after using the bathroom
- after cleaning around the house
- after touching animals, including family pets
- before and after visiting or taking care of any sick friends or relatives
- after blowing one's nose, coughing, or sneezing
- after being outside (playing,

gardening, walking the dog, etc.)



Don't underestimate the power of hand washing! The few seconds you spend at the sink could save you trips to the doctor's office.





How to Set Screen Rules That Stick

Easy tips for limiting kids' computer, TV, game, and movie time.

In many homes, getting kids to turn off their cell phones or shut down the video games can incite a revolt. And though there can be educational benefits to some screen time, you may not know when the learning stops and idle activity begins.

There are lots of great TV shows, apps, games, and websites geared for preschoolers. But too much time spent in front of a screen interferes with the activities that are essential for growing brains and bodies.



Every family will have different amounts of time that they think is "enough." <u>What's important is giving it some thought, creating age-appropriate limits (with built-in flexibility for special circumstances), making media choices you're comfortable with, and modeling responsible screen limits for your kids. Try these guidelines to create screen rules that stick.</u>

Go for quality and age-appropriateness. Not everything for preschoolers needs to be a so-called "brain-builder," but there's a difference between mindless and mind *ful* entertainment. The learning ratings at www.commonsensemedia.org can steer you toward titles that help preschoolers work on developmental skills like sharing, cooperation, and emotional intelligence.

Sit with them, and enjoy the discovery process. There will always be moments when you need to rely on the TV or an app to distract your preschooler while you get something done. But as much as you can, enjoy media together. Little hands and developing brains really benefit from your company (and guidance!).

Begin setting limits when kids are little. Habits get ingrained early, so make sure you establish clear screen-time rules when your kids are young. For games, apps, and websites, you may need to set a timer. For TV, just say "one show."

The Center Early Childhood Programs - Policy Council Minutes - Meeting Date October 14, 2015

Attending: Tasha Dunning, Alison Hoagland, Alyssa Gallegos, Itzel Saldivar, Jen Boeve, Thea Gab, Bethany Godsman, Kelly Martinez, Mari Spinner. Guests - Harmony Jump, Tanya Lenhard, Claire Oatey, Mary Cannell

The meeting was called to order at 5:14pm by the Chair, Mari Spinner.

Approval of Agenda and Minutes: The agenda and minutes were reviewed. Tanya requested an addition to the New Business portion of the agenda for new staff approval. Jen moved to approve the agenda with this addition; Alison seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Thea moved to approve the minutes from the last regular meeting in September and the special meeting in September August; Jen seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

Roll Call: Bethany conducted roll call and determined a quorum was present.

<u>Treasurer Report:</u> Alison reported the balance of the Parent Activity fund to be \$775.99. A deduction for this month will be for the meeting meal. Mary encouraged members to think of what they would like to do with the remaining funds, as they must be spent by the end of January. She mentioned that the Parent Resource Center could use some books on toilet training and supporting kids with incarcerated parents, in both English and Spanish.

Committee Reports: Harmony gave the School Board report including their activities with writing and revising policies. There are three members' terms that are ending this year, and three candidates running unopposed to fill those spots. We will reach out to the new members and conduct the necessary trainings after they are officially seated. Harmony also invited members to the fall Parent Summit coming up on November 9 at 6:30pm at LCHS. Mary reported on the LCECC site visit and last regular meeting. The ECC members gave warm reviews of the program to the representative from the Colorado Department of Education who was also in attendance. The representative also presented the annual report of the Colorado Preschool Program at The Center, which indicated we "exceed expectations". The report also identifies areas for even further quality improvement.

<u>Training:</u> Mary reviewed the information in binders about "How to Run a Meeting". The discussion included information about agendas, minutes, parliamentary procedure and meeting etiquette.

<u>Director's Report</u>: Tanya presented the Director's report, including information on enrollment, attendance, progress on program goals, health screenings, trainings, staff transitions, and updates on PDIS and QRIS. Currently 66 of the 68 Head Start spots in the building have been filled and recruitment efforts continue to fill the remaining two spots. The group asked questions about what happens if the spots do not ever get filled. Tanya replied that she has been in contact with our Program Specialist about the reasons for low enrollment and have received feedback that our continued recruitment efforts are acceptable. We do expect to have all the spots filled before winter. OHS would only make a decision about decreasing our spots and budget if the trend continued over a long period of time. Claire reviewed the Budget Report and said we are in good shape so far for the year, but we are watching a few lines to be careful. Members suggested asking parents for supply donations to ease the strain on that budget category and help boost in kind donations. Mary responded we would work on that, but would be careful to do so in a way that did not imply that families were required to make donations.

New Business: Tanya presented the Program Goals, and explained how there are different objectives planned for each year of the five year plan. Claire presented the Continuation Grant application. Members had been sent full copies of last year's grant and this year's grant with updates, and additional copies were available during the meeting. Claire also supplied a three page summary of the changes and updates to facilitate conversation. Claire talked about the reasons behind the updates and how those decisions were made. Mary reminded members about Policy Council's role in shared governance of the program and that the grant would be presented to the school board later this month, before the due date. Kelly moved to approve the Continuation Grant application; Jen seconded. The motion passed with all votes in favor and none opposed. Alyssa moved to approve the Program Goals; Kelly seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

Mary reviewed the Community Complaint process and gave examples of when it could be used. Thea moved to approve the Community Complaint Policy; Allison seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Mary reviewed the Policy Council Bylaws, including that these list the purpose of the group, membership requirements, officer duties, and reimbursement policies among other items. Tasha moved to approve the Bylaws; Jen seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Mary informed the group that Tamsey Tufte had asked to be excused from Policy Council due to other personal commitments. Alison moved to thank Tamsey for her service and excuse her from further duties; Kelly seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. The members asked Mary to recruit two more Head Start parent reps to serve as alternates on the Council. An election will take place as soon as some candidates are identified.

Tanya explained that the Strategic Plan document and the Program Improvement Plan were complete, but still undergoing review. She asked the Council to delay their review of these documents until the next meeting, so that the final versions could be presented. Bethany moved to table the approval of the Program Improvement Plan and Strategic Plan until the next regular meeting; Alyssa seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Tanya recommended Anne Wibbenmeyer and Desiree Trujillo to be hired as new substitute teachers and reviewed their qualifications. Kelly moved to approve these new hires; Jen seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: Mary addressed a concern found in the suggestion box last month, and repeated this month about the rule for no outside food being permitted during classroom celebrations. Mary explained that The Center receives funds from the CACFP program, and not allowing outside food is one of the regulations that must be followed in order to keep receiving those funds, which are around \$5000 per month. The rule also protects young children with food allergies and helps with behavior management for the rest of the day. The council recommended a newsletter article or other form of parent notification about the rules of this grant to help make parents aware of why that rule exists.

<u>Announcements</u>: The announcements from the agenda were noted, including the ongoing enrollment for this school year, the upcoming Immigration Information meeting, Home Visits, school closure days, Pumpkin Patch, classroom celebrations, and the next regular Policy Council meeting on November 11..

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 6:55pm by Mari.
