Prepare for your home visit by writing down some of your questions. Having a list ahead of time will help you
remember the things you want to cover the most. Here are some examples of questions that might be helpful to
ask:

What are my child's strengths?

How does my child interact with the other children?

What does my child enjoy at school?

Is there anything we can do at home to reinforce the skills that you are working on in the class room?

- Keep in mind that this is an established partnership where you and the teachers are working together to support
 your child. Teachers will have many successes and updates on progress to share, but this may also include talking through areas where your child has room to develop. This is all a part of the home visit. The partnership
 between home and school is a key relationship to benefit your child.
- Share any relevant information with your child's classroom teachers. This may include updated contact information or any recent changes that may have taken place at home. Feel free to schedule another time to meet if you were not able to cover everything during the home visit.

We look forward to meeting with each of our families and can't wat to share all of the good news from our class-rooms with you!

CROSS WITH CARE

If you child has to cross the street to board the bus, he or she must:

Make eye contact with the bus driver. The bus driver should be able to see your child at all times.

Wait for the bus driver to signal that it's safe to cross

Watch and listen for cars.

Stay at least 10 feet away from the bus and cross in front of the bus.

Always stay out of the danger zone.

Go over these rules often with your child.

For Attendance and The Bus please call 486-6925 and leave a message.

This line is checked right before the bus goes out each day, and attendance is recorded from the messages. Other lines may be checked only once each day.

If your child is sick and has a fever, keep him/her at home to prevent the spread of illness to others. Public Health and the School District advise parents to keep children home for 24 hours after the child is free from fever without fever reducing medications.

Five Essentials to Meaningful Play

"One of my clearest childhood memories is slithering through the tall grass like a snake with my brother and sister."

When you think back on your childhood, what happy play memories come to mind? Adults today tend to think back on their childhood play memories with nostalgia and often call them the "good old days." Memories of joyful and meaningful play experiences help bind families together emotionally, even long after children are grown. Are our children experience the same kind of joy, meaning and family bonding in their play?

Here are five elements essential to meaningful play that create those rich memories we treasure:

1. Children make their own decisions.

When children choose how to play themselves, they experience freedom making those choices. They also begin to see connections between choice and the consequences or results of that choice. The type of toys or materials parents offer can help their children make more meaningful decisions. Open-ended materials can be used in many ways so children can decide for themselves how to use them. For example, a child can imag ine a block to be a fire truck or any number of things. A toy fire truck, on the other hand, is usually used as a fire truck. Foam pieces, little wooden sticks, ribbon scraps, and other reusable resources are all open-ended materials that inspire create thinking and delight when children use them to make something no one has ever made before.

2. Children are intrinsically motivated

The impulse to play comes from a natural desire to understand the world. This play impulse is as strong as your child's desire for food or sleep. It is the intrinsic motivation that allows a child to regulate her own feel ings and desires in order to keep playing. Because children eventually find it more important to be part of play with their friends than to satisfy their own wants and needs at that moment, children learn self-control. And self-control has been shown to lead to success in later years, especially in today's information age, where distractions are a part of daily life.

3. Children become immersed in the moment

In true play, children are so fully engaged that they lose awareness of their surroundings, time and space. In this risk-free atmosphere where reality is suspended, children have the security and safety they need to experience, try new ideas, and investigate the laws of nature. Although they are immersed in their play, children still can recognize reality versus fantasy, something parents often wonder about.

4. Play is spontaneous, not scripted

Often, play is totally unplanned. Other times, play is planned but a child impulsively makes a change. One child changes his mind, or perhaps a toy does not cooperate. This sense of the unknown provides children with opportunities to develop flexibility in their thinking and decision making, which is a vital life skill.

5.Play is enjoyable

Play always has an emotional response attached to it. Without this emotional connection, the experience is simply an activity; it is not PLAY. Enjoyment is the direct result of engaging in play. It is FUN! These five essential elements of play outline why play provides your child with a rich experience. And isn't that what we want for our children, to develop play memories that will become the "good old days?"

How sick is too sick to come to school?

As parents, we often see our kids starting to get sick or ending an illness period and wondering if they are too sick to come to school. Should I send them? Should I keep them home one more day? What is the rule for keeping them home? Oftentimes when you are in the middle of trying to make a decision or remember the rules, we are sick as well or may have other children who are sick and it can be incredibly hard to know what is right. Here are a few reminders, to the most common illnesses we see at The Center, as to when to send your child to school.

- 1. Fever: Children must be kept at home if they have a fever of 100.4 or higher- EVEN IF YOU HAVE GIVEN THEM MEDICINE. During this stage of an illness they are the most contagious and need to be kept at home so all of their friends, the staff, and others whom they may come into contact with do not get sick as well. "No matter the illness, keep your child home if she has a fever. It may seem harmless enough, but assume any fever is a symptom of a contagious condition. Viruses that cause fevers are contagious as long as the fever is above a 100.4 degrees F. reading rectally. For these, ask your pediatrician if acetaminophen or ibuprofen are safe for your child, and encourage your little one to drink lots of cool fluids." - 2. **Diarrhea**: Children who have diarrhea should stay home. It can be caused from any number of items, and can be very hard to pinpoint the exact reason. "Diarrhea is usually caused by gastrointestinal (GI) infections caused by germs (viruses, bacteria, or parasites). A diet high in sugar (for instance, from drinking lots of juice) also can bring on diarrhea." (https://kidshealth.org/en/parents/diarrhea.html) Diarrhea can be controlled by washing your child's hands and bathroom surfaces thoroughly. When it stops, it is okay for your child to come back to school.
- 3. **Coughing**: Children cough, for a long time, we know. The time to keep your child at home when they are coughing is when it is severe and uncontrolled. If it impacts their day to a point where they are not able to participate normally, keep them home. Coughing is hard, and especially as a parent, hard to watch your child suffer through a cough that won't seem to go away. Use your best judgement and always let their teacher know when they may have a bad cough, just so they can be aware and watch your child as well.

The top items to remember when trying to decide if your child should come to school are:

- 1. **Can your child participate in normal classroom activities**<u>- *INCLUDING GOING OUTSIDE TO PLAY?*</u> If they are not able to go outside, then they should not be at school.
- 2. The child needs more care than teachers and staff are able to give them in a normal day.
- 3. Look at The Center's Sick Child Policy and make sure that your child has none of the symptoms listed on it. If they do, then keep them home.

Feel free to call and ask Ms. Lizz (486-6923) if you have any questions regarding this policy or if your child should be at school. We would rather answer your questions than have your child at school feeling sick.



<u>The Center Early Childhood Programs – Policy Council Minutes – Meeting Date – January 8, 2019.</u>

<u>Attending:</u> Chelsa Parsons, Christina Wood-Call In, Anahise Shoukas, Beverly Lauchner, Marika Guthrie, Maria Perez, and Viviana Cano-Call In

Not Attending: Sarah Hart, Kelly Callahan, and Casey McGovern

Roll Call: Lisa and Beverly called roll and determined that a quorum was present.

Approval of Agenda: Marika made a motion to approve the agenda, and Anahise seconded. All were in favor and no one was opposed.

<u>Approval of Meeting Minutes:</u> from December 5, 2018 Special meeting and November 5, 2018 Regular Meeting. Marika made a motion to approve the two meeting minutes, and Maria seconded. All were in favor with no one opposed.

New Business: Lisa informed the council that Kelly Callahan has resigned her position on the Policy Council, effective starting this meeting. There is no new staff approvals needed at this time. Tanya did update the Council on staffing changes as well as open positions. The Council received all of the documents for tonight's meeting through e-mail. The Council reviewed the Budget Revision Amendment. Tanya explained that the revisions changes are due to hiring of the Early Head Start home visitor. Her position didn't start until later than expected. Having these extra funds it has been asked to move 20,000 from our operation budget to capital expenditures. Tanya explained with these funds a car would be purchased for the program and the Early Head Start home visitor. The Council had time for discussion and questions. Marika made a motion to accept the Budget Revision Amendment and purchase of a vehicle. Chelsa seconded. All were in favor with no one opposed. Tanya also reviewed the Head Start budget and explained spend down. This needs to take place by January 31, 2019.

Treasures Report: The balance of the Parent Activity Fund is \$470.12.

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> The Council continued to talk about spend down of the Parent Activity Fund. This also must take place by January 31, 2019. There were lots of suggestions made as well as ideas. Lisa will put a few lists together based on their ideas, and then the Council will make their suggestions.

<u>Committee Reports:</u> Ellie reported on the Lake County School Board. The board is working on two best grants; they are looking at one for basic maintenance, and the second for a pre-kindergarten through 2nd grade school. She will keep the council updated.
