#### **Education News**

### How to prepare for parent/teacher conferences

A conference with your child's teacher is similar to a visit to the doctor's office. You have a lot that you want to talk about in a limited amount of time. The more prepared you are going in, the more beneficial the meeting will be for both you and the teacher. Here are some tips for a productive conference, along with a list of good questions to ask the teachers.



Schedule your appointment early. If you're one of the first parents to sign up for a conference, you'll be more likely to get a time that works well for you.

Write down your questions. When you're meeting with the teachers it may be hard to remember what you wanted to talk about. Jot down your questions beforehand and bring them to the conference. Prioritize your questions so you ask the most important ones first in case you run out of time before you can cover everything on your list.

Stick to the topic at hand — your child. Most parent-teacher conferences last only a short time. Don't use this time to ask questions about basic school policies. That kind of information can usually be found in the school's handbook, on its website, or by calling the office during business hours. This is your chance to get detailed feedback on your child, so make the most of it.

If you have a specific question or issue that doesn't come up, don't hesitate to ask. The teachers may not realize that you're concerned about something in particular. You know your child better than anyone, so take the initiative.

Try not to get defensive. It's natural to feel a bit nervous about parent-teacher conferences. Every parent wants to hear how wonderful his or her child is — and the teachers should tell you about your child's special skills and achievements. But one of the main functions of these conferences is to point out areas where your child has room to develop. The teachers may even suggest extra help, testing, or some ways to increase consistency between school and home.

Keep in mind that this is a part of all parent-teacher conferences. Resist the urge to argue with the teachers or dismiss their comments. They are not blaming you or your child. The point of this meeting is to get an assessment of how your child is doing in school and to look for ways you can help. Remind yourself that the teachers are on your side and you have the same goal: to help your child learn all that he or she can.

Get a feel for the social scene. How your child fits in socially can have an effect on how well he or she learns. Ask the teachers how your child gets along with the other children.

Give the teacher relevant information. Let the teachers know of any changes at home. A new baby, a divorce, or a death in the family can all affect the way your child behaves in the classroom.

Stay in touch with the teacher. Now that you've opened the door to communication, don't wait until the next conference to talk. Call the teachers in a few weeks if you have a question or if you need to update them on something you talked about during the conference.

### Health News

### February is National Children's Dental Health Month!

#### Below are a few tips on how to keep your child's pearly whites bright and shiny!

- 1. Parents and carers of children aged 0-2 are encouraged to brush their child's teeth as soon as the first tooth appears, using a soft toothbrush and water only.
- 2. It is not recommended to use fluoride toothpaste for children aged 0-2 years. (Professional advice on the use of fluoride toothpaste should be considered when a child below 2 years of age is thought to be at high risk of developing dental decay e.g. children with special needs).



- 3. From age 2-7 years use a small pea size amount of fluoride toothpaste.
- 4. Parents/carers of children under the age of 7 should brush their child's teeth until they are able to do so properly themselves. Children should be encouraged to spit and not rinse after brushing so that the effects of fluoride toothpaste are not diluted.
- 5. Brush twice a day at bedtime and at one other time during the day

Research shows if a child has dental decay at a young age that they are likely to have dental decay as an adult. We all want to have healthy teeth and nice smiles as adults and this starts with taking care of children's teeth from a young age.

The health benefits of good oral health are immense; getting children actively involved in looking after their oral health from an early age improves both their oral and general health as adults.




## Calling all DADS!

### How Fathers Can Help Their Children Deal with Bullies

Fathers can help their children put school bullying in perspective with just a few simple tools. Just like with your toolbox in your garage, not every tool works in every circumstance, but one or more of these tools will help your children understand bullying, deal with it when it happens, and be less likely to be a victim when the bullies come to call.

Remember that it is not about your child. Bullies don't target children for bullying because the child somehow invites it. Bullies are bullies because <u>they</u> have a problem, not because the victims do. Whether your child is different in some way from the mainstream or not, the bullies are operating out of their own problems and challenges, not your child's.



Take your child's side with the system. Sometimes adults are reluctant to intervene or maybe they don't see the problem. Get involved at school and help your child navigate the troubled waters. Keep going until you find someone that will help.

Have a safe place. Teach your child to play near the playground monitor and go to a large group of children rather than playing off on her own where she is an easier target. Talk to the school and see what they recommend.

Plan out a response. When your child has a plan, and practices the plan, they will be better equipped to handle the situation when it comes up. Talk about bullying and act out some scenarios where your child responds appropriately. A little imagination can go a long way in helping them remember what to do.

Share stories. Granted, bullying today can be a lot more sophisticated and scary than it was when we were children. But having your child hear stories about how others (cousins, siblings, friends) handled bullying effectively can give them tools to handle it.

Stand up then walk away. One element that seems to work is to not be intimidated. We might think that the bully will "up the ante" but usually they just look for a weaker victim. Suggest that your child tell the bully to stop and then just walk away and ignore them. The first step takes a lot of bravery, but your child will build character one challenge at a time.

Avoid responding violently. While it may be a common defense mechanism to respond to bullying with a physical confrontation, it almost never works. Trying to take the bully out only provokes further escalation of the bullying behavior.

Fathers can do a lot to help their children learn how to deal with school bullying and can give them some excellent tools to address these bullying issues. Help them understand bullying, to be brave when bullied and to use all the resources they have to stay safe and positive.

The Center Early Childhood Programs - Policy Council Minutes - Meeting Date January 14, 2015

Roll Call: Cheryl conducted roll call and determined a quorum was present.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 5:10pm by the Chair, Liz Flores. Introductions were made.

Approval of Minutes: Minutes for the December 17<sup>th</sup> special meeting were approved. Ann Stanek motioned to approve the minutes and Tamsey Tufte seconded the motion. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Approval of the November 12<sup>th</sup> minutes was postponed for next meeting because the second page of the minutes was missing.

Chairperson: Liz Flores led a discussion of the roles and responsibilities of Policy Council. Kate Bartlett asked members to share what's been working and what needs improvement. Emily Bordogna acknowledged that we are in a transition time as we hire a new director and that Policy Council's feedback is valued. Liz reviewed with Policy Council a synopsis of roles and responsibilities. Based on feedback, Emily proposed bringing in Janet from Head Start to train us on how to run policy council, establishing ground rules and norms for meeting. Emily and Kate committed to contacting Janet to help set up a 3-4 hour evening training.

Approval of Agenda: A revised agenda was approved following a discussion of Roles and Responsibilities of Policy Council. The revised agenda covered the Director Report, 2015-2016 Parent Activity Fund Budget, and Next Regular Council meeting date. All other business was postponed to the February meeting and training. Mari Spinner moved to approve the amended agenda and Erin Allaman seconded the motion. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

Interim Director Report: Kate Bartlett gave the budget report. There is approximately \$85,000 to spend in January, and they are comfortable in doing this. They are placing supply orders for teachers and taking care of annual payments with the district. Policy Council was given copies of the HR Policy Revision, Holiday Pay Policy revision and agreed that a subcommittee could review these documents to meet and discuss with Kate Bartlett on January 20<sup>th</sup> 4:30pm at the District Office. The subcommittee will then give a recommendation to Policy Council and vote via email. Emily Bordogna gave the Director Report. The Center is looking at a new structure for leadership. They will shift some of the education manager role to the director to create a more instructional-leadership focused role for the director. Instead of an education manager, they will create a grant manager position that will take on financial, grant, website, reports, and other duties to support the director. The Center will be looking to hire for these two new positions, ideally hiring a director first and then grant manager second. Emily asked for volunteers for the hiring committee, Erin A and Liz volunteered.

Treasurer: There is \$192 remaining in the parent activity fund. Policy Council voted to spend the remaining funds on food for the Policy Council training with Janet and small helmets to go with the Strider Bikes. Erin Watkins motioned to approve spending the remainder of the parent activity fund and Mari Spinner seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

New Business: Because the February 11<sup>th</sup> meeting conflicts with parent-teacher conferences, Policy Council agreed to move the February meeting to February 18<sup>th</sup>. The West Park Wellness Committee asked for a letter of support for the GOCO Grant to improve the West Park Playground. Cheryl Talbot agreed to write a letter of support on behalf of Policy Council. Liz agreed to sign as Chairperson.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 7:08pm
