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### Transportation Updates

From Jenny Mascarenaz Transportation Manager

#### <u>Car Seat Checkup</u>

Top 5 Things To Do

*Right Seat.* This is an easy one. Check the label on your car seat to **make sure it's appropriate for your child's age, weight and height.** Like milk, your car seat has an expiration date. Just double check the label on your car seat to make sure it is still safe.

*Right Place.* Kids are VIPs, just ask them. We know all VIPs ride in the back seat, so keep all children in the back seat until they are 13.

*Right Direction.* You want to keep your child in a rear-facing car seat for as long as possible, usually until around age two. When he or she outgrows the seat, move your child to a forward-facing car seat. Make sure to attach the top tether after you tighten and lock the seat belt or lower anchors.

*Inch Test.* Once your car seat is installed, give it a good shake at the base. Can you move it more than an inch side to side or front to back? A properly installed seat will not move more than an inch.

*Pinch Test.* Make sure the harness is tightly buckled and coming from the correct slots (check car seat manual). Now with the chest clip placed at armpit level, pinch the strap at **your child's shoulder. If you are unable to pinch any excess webbing, you're good to go.** 

Please read the vehicle and car seat instruction manuals to help you with this checklist. If **you are having even the slightest trouble, questions or concerns, don't worry about a thing.** Certified child passenger safety technicians are waiting to help or even double check your work. Visit safekids.org to find a car seat inspection event in your community.

#### Domains of Learning

Hello families! Happy October, it is hard to believe that our first full month of school has gone by already! Our classrooms are in full swing with lots of learning and playing happening every day.

We are excited to be able to share and celebrate all of the great things your children have been doing and learning in the classrooms at our upcoming <u>home visits</u>. Our teachers will be sharing how your child is doing in each of the domains of learning and development. These identified domains represent the areas of child development and early learning that are essential for school.

- Social Emotional fosters emotional and behavioral health through the development of self-awareness and self-regulation skills. This domain also focuses on building healthy social relationships with other children and adults and skills such as sharing, helping, taking turns and resolving conflict.
- *Physical* supports the development of gross motor skills such as balancing, running, jumping, throwing and catching- and fine motor skills -such as cutting, drawing, and writing.
- *Cognitive* fosters the development of reasoning and problem solving skills, as well as the ability to show flexibility and persistence when completing tasks or within play.
- *Literacy* supports the development of skills that lay the foundation for reading and writing. These skills include developing an appreciation for books, exposure to print and the alphabet, and encouraging early phonological awareness skills like rhyme.
- Language develops communication skills, such as listening to and participating in conversations with others.
- *Math* fosters an understanding of numbers and their quantities, as well as exposure to other math concepts like shapes, patterns, and measurement skills.

Look for more information concerning our upcoming <u>home visits on October 22 and</u> <u>October 23</u> in your child's cubby or backpack. We look forward to meeting with each of our families and can't wait to share all of our good news from our classrooms with you!

### Field trips to public library

Beginning this month, each classroom will take a field trip to the public library once a month. The children's library staff will guide the children

through some story activities at each visit. Classroom teachers will accompany children at all times.

The director of Lake County Public Library has secured a grant to pay for bus transportation through February, after that these will be walking field trips.

Kids love it when their parents go on field trips with them. Please let your child's teacher know if you can visit the public library with your child's friends. You can ride with them on the bus, or meet them at the library.

#### Halloween Safety Tips from SafeKids.org

Everyone loves a good scare on Halloween, but not when it comes to child safety.

There are several easy and effective behaviors that parents can share with kids to help reduce their risk of injury

Walk Safely

- Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks.
- Look left, right and left again when crossing and keep looking as you cross.
- Put electronic devices down and keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.
- Teach children to make eye contact with drivers before crossing in front of them.
- Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible. Children should walk on direct routes with the fewest street crossings.
- Watch for cars that are turning or backing up. Teach children to never dart out into the street or cross between parked cars.

Trick or Treat With an Adult

• Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without adult supervision. If kids are mature enough to be out without supervision, they should stick to familiar areas that are well lit and trick-or-treat in groups.

Keep Costumes Both Creative and Safe

- Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors.
- Choose face paint and makeup whenever possible instead of masks, which can obstruct a child's vision.
- Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them see and be seen by drivers.
- When selecting a costume, make sure it is the right size to prevent trips and falls. Drive Extra Safely on Halloween
- Slow down and be especially alert in residential neighborhoods. Children are excited on Halloween and may move in unpredictable ways.
- Take extra time to look for kids at intersections, on medians and on curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys slowly and carefully.
- Eliminate any distractions inside your car so you can concentrate on the road and your surroundings.
- Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from greater distances.
- Popular trick-or-treating hours are 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. so be especially alert for kids during those hours.

#### Solve the Communication Puzzle with Your Kid

Think about the last conversation you had with your child. Did you walk away feeling closer to them, or did it raise your blood pressure by a few points? Was your child smiling, or looking for something else to do? Or was he rolling his eyes?



For every dad, good communication is vital. Although some dads are

fantastic at getting their kids to open up for those heart-to-heart talks, **it's more like a puzzle for** many guys. And if *we* **aren't great at it, how can we equip our children to be good communica**-tors?

Communication is a key way we show our children how to love. We need to make communication a high priority so that we can teach our kids by example and through practice. The **ideas you'll find below are targeted to dads of sons, although you'll find that many of them can** be adapted for use with daughters, too.

*To get your son to talk, don't try to get him to talk*. Sure, face-to-face chats are great if you can pull 'em off. But usually, the best approach is to talk "sideways." A boy will talk to you much more easily while you're working on a project together or doing something fun. So enlist his help as you work on the car, shoot some hoops, hang drywall, run errands together, or join him in something he wants to do. During that activity, he may bring up something that's been on his mind or willingly respond to a question you throw out.

*Watch for cues that he's ready to talk*. Maybe he talks more at a certain time of the day, or when he's in a particular mood. The cues may be subtle, but you can learn to spot them.

*Be available.* He may have a pressing question at eleven o'clock at night—or at three o'clock in the morning. His concerns may sound hair-brained or trivial or way off the mark. That's okay, dad. Be flexible. Let him know that he can come to you anytime, about anything. Those times may be rare, so be ready. And put aside the cellphone or iPad, or turn off the TV when it happens.

*Affirm him verbally*. Positive words give sons confidence and belonging, and provide a model of a man who can express love in healthy ways. We need to tell our sons how much they mean to us, point out their positive character traits, and say, "I love you, and I'm proud to be your dad."

Finally, if your sons are still very young, do all you can to *build a close relationship with him now*. If it's easy for him to talk to you during these younger years, there won't be a gap to bridge, and that will do a lot to ease the strain once he becomes a teenager.

In a nutshell, good communication is about *listening first* before making our opinions known, and *doing away with lectures* in favor of two-way discussions. Also, we have to *be open to receiving feedback*, even if it's negative, and *take the initiative* in rebuilding relationships when fractures occur—having the courage to admit when we're wrong and seek forgiveness.

The Center Early Childhood Programs - Policy Council Minutes - Meeting Date September 9, 2015

Attending: Skye Calvert, Tasha Dunning, Alison Hoagland, Alyssa Gallegos, Itzel Saldivar, Maria del Socorro, Jen Boeve, Thea Gab, Bethany Godsman, Kelly Martinez, Sandra Cano, Tammy Taylor, Mari Spinner. Training: The meeting was called to order at 5:10pm by Mary Cannell, Family & Community Partnerships Manager, in the absence of the previous year's chairperson. She began the meeting by welcoming the newly elected members of Policy Council and thanking them for their commitment and service to the program. Mary then led a discussion about The Center's different funding sources and explained Policy Council's role in the shared governance of the Head Start program, along with program staff and the school board.

All members signed into the meeting. Mary reported no new voicemail messages in Policy Council's box and one new note in the Suggestion Box. She offered to address the suggestion box note at a future meeting, in consideration of the lengthy agenda. Members signed confidentiality agreements.

Election of New Officers: Mary explained the duties of the three officer positions. Mari offered to serve as chair, Alison offered to serve as Treasurer, and Bethany offered to serve as Secretary. No other members expressed interest in filling the officer roles. The group unanimously approved these three members as their new officers. Mari took over running the meeting as Chair.

Approval of Agenda and Minutes: The agenda and minutes were reviewed. Tammy moved to approve the agenda; Jen seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Tammy moved to approve the minutes from the last regular meeting in May, and for the special meetings in June and August; Alison seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

Roll Call: Bethany conducted roll call and determined a guorum was present.

Treasurer Report: Alison reported the balance of the Parent Activity fund to be \$925.19. A deduction for this month will be for the meeting meal. Mary explained the purpose of the Parent Activity Fund, and the breakdown of different categories for permitted use of the funds. Some examples of past projects were highlighted. She mentioned that the fiscal year runs from February through January, which is different than the school year. Committee Reports: Harmony gave the School Board report including reviews of the summer construction projects, the opening of the school based health center, and the addition of student representatives to the school board. Mary explained the roles of The Center's different parent committees and invited members to sign up for at least one to provide reports from those committees back to Policy Council. Mary explained the purpose of the Lake County Early Childhood Council and the District Accountability Committee and invited parents to those meetings as well. The Head Start parents were assigned classrooms for which they will be the representatives. They reviewed and signed letters which will be distributed to the families of children in their classroom.

**Director's Report**: Tanya presented a short Director's report, since there was only one day of school last month in August. She mentioned that attendance has been good, and that currently 62 of the 68 Head Start spots in the building have been filled. She invited members to do outreach to help fill the 6 remaining spots. She reported that all of the building management and classroom teaching positions are filled. The only staff position left to be filled is for a bilingual aide. Members were invited to serve on the interview committee for that position.

New Business: Mary directed members to their binders and reviewed the contents for the Information and September tabs. These included the timeline for review of policies, information about the roles and responsibilities of the Policy Council including shared governance, a schedule of meeting dates and members' names, an agenda for Leadership Training, the mission statement and governing values of The Center, a school district calendar for the year, a copy of the Notice of Award for this year's grant, the Self-Assessment results from 2014-15 school year, the 2014-15 PIR report, a list of commonly used acronyms, a mileage log for reimbursement purposes, a copy of last year's grant applications, and the Program Governance policy. Jen moved to approve the Program Governance policy, and Thea seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

Unfinished Business: None

Announcements: The announcements from the agenda were noted, including the ongoing enrollment for this school year, the upcoming Family Fun Night, Picture Day, and the next regular Policy Council meeting on October 14.
