Darcey comes to us with an AA degree in Early Childhood Education and over 14 years of experience teaching young children.






Transportation Updates

CROSS WITH CARE

If you child has to cross the street to board the bus, he or she must:

- Make eye contact with the bus driver. The bus driver should be able to see your child at all times.
- Wait for the bus driver to signal that it's safe to cross
- Watch and listen for cars.
- Stay at least 10 feet away from the bus and cross in <u>front</u> of the bus.
- Always stay out of the danger zone.

Go over these rules often with your child.

Education News

Early Literacy Skills

A child's journey towards literacy involves learning to speak, listen, read, understand, watch, draw and write. You can help your child develop these skills.

Talking, singing, playing sound and word games, reading, writing and drawing with your child are great ways to establish a good literacy foundation. Everyday activities, like going to the local shops or library, as well as special treats — trips to the museum or zoo — all provide lots of opportunities for literacy development.

Many parents feel they haven't got time for literacy development activities. You don't need lots of time — five minutes a few times a day is often enough. The key is to use different opportunities to help your child learn. These can range from things like taking a trip to the local store to a night-time story before bed.



Talk and sing

Talking and singing with children can teach them about sounds and how sounds come together to form language. By teaching your child language games and songs, you'll be helping him to develop listening and speaking skills. It's also important to listen to your child – this helps you learn about the stories and songs he most enjoys.

Read and make books

Reading with your child helps develop his vocabulary, ability to listen and comprehend, and ability to understand the purpose of print. You'll also be helping to set up a lifelong positive attitude towards reading.

Draw and write

From an early age, children love to try to 'write' like their older siblings or parents. Playwriting (scribble) and drawing helps your child develop the fine motor skills needed for writing with pencils and pens later. It also helps him begin to recognize and remember letter shapes.

Stress Management for Families

Mental Health Tips for children and their caretakers

"I'm so stressed out!" We've all said that before. Everyone has their own set of stressors that affect their ability to cope with everyday life. Often adults can forget that little ones feel overly stressed sometimes too.



Just like you, children need extra comfort when they feel uneasy. Your child may not know how to tell you what is bothering him.

You might try mirroring his facial expressions with your own while identifying the emotion. For example: "Your eyes look sad. Are you feeling sad?"

If your child seems especially clingy, she may not be feeling well. Or, she may be feeling stressed and need reassurance.

If you are feeling under pressure to complete a task when your child is demanding your attention, it may help her if you get down on her level. Reassure her that you notice her distress.

You could show her the clock. Point to the short hand of the clock and tell her that the arrow is pointing to the five, for example. Then say, "When the arrow points to the 10, I'm going to stop what I'm doing and read with you!"

Of course you can pick your child's favorite activity, or you could even include her in the activity that you're working on.

Don't forget that everyone feels better when they are treated with kindness. So go easy on yourself. Reach out to a safe person in your life for support. Parenting is tough! We are all here for you.

If you need ideas of how to relieve stress, watch your child. He experiences the world through fun and play. Take needed breaks, and never stop playing!



<u>Child Find</u>

<u>Early intervention for</u> children with special needs

Every county in Colorado has professionals who are trained to evaluate children in a variety of areas, including cognitive functioning, physical functioning, hearing and vision,



Once the child find evaluation team, which includes the parents, has gathered sufficient information used to determine a child's eligibility for early intervention or preschool special education services, an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP; birth to three years of age) or an Individual Education Plan (IEP; three to five years of age) is developed and services begin shortly.

Children under the age of six may be referred at any time for an eligibility determination for early intervention (ages birth to three) or preschool special education services (ages three through five).



Play A Iphabet Ball to help kids learn to read

Kids learn best when they are having fun, and it's even better when they're spending time with you.

What You Need for Alphabet Ball

- A medium-sized plastic ball. It needs to be big enough that children can easily read the letters that will be placed on it.
- Alphabet stickers. Randomly place the stickers all over the ball.
- A child who's ready to play.



Alphabet Ball for Toddlers and Young Preschoolers

Sit on the floor a few feet away from your child. Roll the ball to him. Call out the letter that's on top when the ball stops. Point to the letter for the toddler who's just getting started learning the alphabet and say the letter again.

Sing the alphabet song. Emphasize the letter you're teaching when you reach it in the song.

Have your child roll the ball back to you. Repeat the steps above to learn a new letter.

An alternate teaching method is to make the sound of the letter. - For example, instead of saying "Ay!" for the letter A, you would say "ah." This early introduction to phonics helps him learn letter sounds and prepares him for reading.

Alphabet Ball for Older Preschoolers

With this age group, you have a couple of variations on how to play the alphabet learning game.

- 1. Preschoolers who know the alphabet and each letter's sounds can now work on combining those letter sounds with words. Roll the ball or throw it to each other. The person with the ball says the first letter they see when they get the ball. The other person has to say the first word that comes to mind that starts with the letter. For example, Billy gets the ball and says, "C." Mommy says, "Cat!"
- 2. Try a different twist on this game. As you roll the ball to your child, say a word. Once your child gets the ball, he has to quickly find the first letter of the word you just said. Set a timer and try to beat each other's times.

The Center Early Childhood Programs - Policy Council Minutes - Meeting Date October 12, 2016

<u>Attending</u>: Thea Gab, Crystal Flores, Erin Duggin, Alyssa Gallegos, Bethany Godsman, Amy Small. Guests –Tanya Lenhard, Claire Oatey, Ellie Solomon, Mary Cannell

Not attending: Rosa Guzman, Maria Salas, Sandra Cano, Danielle Swango, Kelly Martinez

The meeting was called to order at 5:25pm by Thea Gab, Policy Council chair. There were no messages on voicemail. Mary reported one unsigned note in the Suggestion Box asking about bus services.

<u>Approval of Agenda and Minutes</u>: The agenda and minutes from the last regular meeting were reviewed, but approval of them was put off until the next regular meeting due to a lack of a quorum.

<u>Roll Call</u>: Amy arrived late to the meeting, so in her absence, Mary conducted roll call and determined that a quorum was not present. It was determined to go through the agenda and discuss all items in the hope that some members would arrive late and approvals could be made.

<u>Treasurer Report:</u> Crystal reported the balance of the Parent Activity fund to be \$861.35. The last expenditure was for part of the meeting meal in September. Additional deductions will be made for the catering last month and the meeting meal for this month. Mary reviewed the purpose of the PAF and its potential uses, with a reminder that it all must be spent by the end of the fiscal year on January 31, 2017. Thea encouraged members to come to the November meeting with some ideas for potential expenditures. She recommended a program, instead of physical resources for checkout, since there are a number of those already in the Parent Resource Center in Room 9

<u>Committee Reports:</u> Ellie gave a school board report. They approved the Continuation Grant and Supplemental Duration Grant at their meeting the night before. LCIS is off of turnaround status with the state. They are forming new graduation requirements. She invited members to attend school board meetings. Mary reported on the LCECC meeting. That group serves as the District Advisory Council for the Center's CPP grant. They did a site visit, reviewed the annual report, and set some goals for program improvement. The other committees did not meet last month. Thea asked members about forming a committee to potentially improve the school age playground. Some ideas for possible funding

<u>Training:</u> Mary called members' attention to the training materials in their binders regarding meeting etiquette and parliamentary procedure.

<u>Director's Report</u>: Claire presented the budget report and reported that the budget is right on track, especially with the extra funds for the COLA increase. She talked about the jump in In Kind donations, which are due to calculating depreciation on the building. Tanya presented the Director's Report and highlighted some different items. She reported that The Center will be sponsoring the 21st Century programs on our CACFP account.

New Business: Claire reviewed updates to the Continuation Grant application with updates on program goals and informational items. She provided a handout for reference. Ellie mentioned some of the questions that school board had asked and had answered to their satisfaction. Policy Council praised the management staff for the thorough understanding of the performance standards and commitment to a high quality program. Claire also presented the updated version of the Supplemental Duration Grant and explained that the big difference from the original application which had been approved in June was the change in service hours to be exactly 1020 and the necessary budget adjustments to accommodate that change. Claire presented an updated draft of the In Kind reimbursement policy and the justification for the requested changes due to the increase in teacher salaries. Tanya presented Darcey Byers as a candidate for a new preschool teacher and reviewed her qualifications. Crystal also gave her impressions of the new candidate from serving on the interview committee.

There was still not a quorum at this point in the meeting, so no official votes could be taken. Tanya and Thea requested a special meeting to be conducted by email for 4 agenda items needing immediate attention. The four items for the special meeting were the Continuation Grant, the Supplemental Duration Grant, the In Kind Reimbursement policy, and the new staff hire. All members present approved the special meeting request.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: No agenda items in this section were addressed, due to time constraints and limited attendance. We will keep them on the agenda for next month.

<u>Announcements</u>: The announcements from the agenda were noted, including ongoing enrollment for this school year, the upcoming closure for Home Visits, Pumpkin Patch, classroom celebrations, and the next regular Policy Council meeting on November 8. Mary also talked about the Family Leadership Training Institute and encouraged members to attend that training to further their advocacy efforts.

<u>Adjournment</u>: The meeting was adjourned at 6:57pm by Thea.
