# Preschool News—Head Start Updates

#### Winter Data Results

It is hard to believe how time flies! Our classrooms have been in full swing with much learning and fun happening on a daily basis. The teachers continue to observe and interact with the children in their classrooms during their learning and play. Our winter checkpoint has come and gone and we are able to look at our new data. We are very excited to share all of the growth and progress that has been made during the 1st half of the year! This chart shows our growth from fall to winter in each area of development.

Our percentage of children below widely-held expectations has decreased and the percentage of children in either meets or exceeds widely held expectations has increased in all areas of development. This is exactly what we want to see and we are excited to continue the learning and fun throughout this spring!

### **Education News**

One of the main focuses of The Center is to help get our preschoolers ready for school, more specifically ready for Kindergarten. School Readiness is generally defined as providing children with the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in school and later learning and life. To support with this endeavor, The Center has defined school readiness goals to outline specific areas of focus across each domain of learning and development. These goals are listed below.

Physical Development: All children will improve gross and fine motor skills. All children shall have an opportunity to increase knowledge of physical and health practices.

Literacy: All children will gain knowledge of literacy through a love of books, letter and sound recognition, emergent writing skills, and environmental print in their home language.

Math: All children will show an increased knowledge and understanding (in their home language) of how numbers, shapes, and patterns are useful problem solving tools for everyday life activities.

Social and Emotional Development: All children will have a better understanding of, and will demonstrate, positive social interactions with others, as well as developing self-regulation skills and increasing self-awareness and self-efficacy. All children will show an increased awareness of their own emotional and behavioral health needs.

Social Studies: Children will have a better understanding of themselves through an increased sense of, and knowledge about, their community, the natural environment and local history, while supporting their cultural backgrounds.

Approaches to Learning: All children will show an increase in their initiative and curiosity toward learning, they will improve their attentiveness and persistence when completing tasks, and will make gains in cooperation and positive interactions with peers.

Language Development: All children will improve their expressive and receptive language skills in addition to demonstrating competency in their home language; English Language Learners will increase engagement and increase understanding in English literacy activities.

Arts: All children will have increased experiences of expressing their own ideas through creating sounds with voice and instruments, creating objects using a variety of media and materials, portraying events, characters, and stories through symbolic play, and being aware of how their bodies move.

Logic and Reasoning: All children will show an increased ability to recognize, understand, and analyze situations, to remember and retell information, to seek solutions to problems to use symbols and objects to represent other things and to be aware of their own thought processes.

Science: Children will increase their understanding of the scientific process through asking questions, making predictions, explanations, and drawing conclusions as related to their natural and physical world.

These goals are written to reflect growth for all children in each of the defined areas. We use our Teaching Strategies GOLD data to help us determine progress toward each of these goals. Please see Preschool News on page 1 for program winter data results. Your child's teacher also shared individual progress at our recent parent teacher conferences in February. This data will be reviewed again in May after our Spring Checkpoints and teachers will once again share progress at our final home visits on May 11th and 12th.

# Oral Health

Tips for Families from the National Center on Early Childhood Health and Wellness

### You Can Promote Good Oral Health By:

- \* Knowing how to make sure you and your family have healthy mouths and teeth
- \* Helping your children learn good mouth and teeth habits

### Why Is It Important?

When Children Have a Healthy Mouth, They:

- \* Can speak clearly
- \* Can eat healthy foods
- \* Feel good about themselves

#### Having a Healthy Mouth Also Means:

- \* Healthy growth and development
- \* Being able to focus and learn
- \* A pain-free mouth
- \* Lower dental care costs for your family

## Things You Can Do to Help Your Child

- \* Brush your 3-6 year old's teeth with a pea-size amount of fluoride toothpaste 2x a day.
- \* Brush children's teeth or help children brush their teeth until they are about 7 or 8 years old.
- \* Be a role model for oral health! Brush your teeth with fluoride toothpaste twice a day and floss once a day.
- \* Serve healthy meals and snacks like fruits, vegetables, low-fat milk and milk products, whole-grain products, meat, fish, chicken, eggs, and beans.
- \* Limit the number of snacks your child has in a day.
- \* Do not give your child food for rewards.
- \* If your child has not gone to the dentist take him.
- \* Make sure to go to the dentist as often as your dentist would like you to go.



#### Child Find

<u>Early intervention for</u> children with special needs

Every county in Colorado has professionals who are trained to evaluate children in a variety of areas, including cognitive functioning, physical functioning, hearing and vision,



Once the child find evaluation team, which includes the parents, has gathered sufficient information used to determine a child's eligibility for early intervention or preschool special education services, an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP; birth to three years of age) or an Individual Education Plan (IEP; three to five years of age) is developed and services begin shortly.

Children under the age of six may be referred at any time for an eligibility determination for early intervention (ages birth to three) or preschool special education services (ages three through five).



# 10 Steps to Keep Your Kids From Cursing

Words have power. Too often curse words are used in a lazy attempt to achieve some sort of shock value or emotional response. The sad thing about defaulting to curse words is not their offensiveness, but that there is language that can communicate the point on a much deeper level. We need to help our kids develop a command and range of words. Part of that starts by moving them away from defaulting to cursing.



- 1. <u>Be Realistic</u>—Kids curse, whether it is on the bus, at school, or hanging out with their friends. No need to hide your head in the sand and think your child is immune. Your job is to acknowledge this and help your child filter them.
- 2. <u>Set Clear Rules</u> Make it clear that certain words will not be tolerated. Define the words you consider cursing. State clear expectations. If the line is crossed make sure there is a consequence.
- 3. <u>Set The Example</u> They are listening to you always. If you curse in front of your kids, they are going to repeat it eventually. Set the example for your entire family and remove those words from your vocabulary.
- 4. <u>Higher Standard</u> As stated above, there are a wide range of descriptive words and arrangements that communicate more effectively. <u>Set a higher standard by learning new and proper words to describe your feelings.</u>
- 5. <u>The Cuss Jar</u> <u>Anyone caught using the words defined in your home as cursing, shall pay a fine.</u> Dad or Mom may be the biggest contributor. This will help you clean up your act. Take the money you collect every few months and donate it to a charity.
- 6. <u>Choice Of Friends</u> Who is your child hanging out with? Do you know them well? Cursing is a possible indicator of even worse behavior. Teach your child to choose friends that hold their same values. We are affected, good and bad, by people we spend the most time with.
- 7. <u>Give Respect</u> If you curse at your child, it hurts him and vice versa. Sit down and discuss the need to always respect each other in good times and bad. Verbal abuse is not respectful.
- 8. <u>Avoid The Distraction</u> Kids are smart. For example, you come to your son about a bad test grade. He uses a profane adjective in describing his feelings towards that subject. Suddenly you are in a discussion about the word and not the test. They're masking the real issue. Stay on course and come back to the word used afterwards.
- 9. <u>Losing Privileges</u> **If the problem is persistent with your child, it's time to take** things away. When kids lose privileges like iPads, iPhones, and video game units it gets their attention quickly.
- 10. <u>Focus on Building Others Up</u> One piece of wisdom is that our tongue is set on fire with hurtful and obscene words. One of the best ways to quench that fire is to instead focus on using the tongue to build up and encourage others. Practice praise and your children will follow.

The Center Early Childhood Programs - Policy Council Minutes - Meeting Date-February 9, 2017

<u>Attending</u>: Thea Gab, Erin Duggin, Bethany Godsman, Chelsea Luna Garcia, Crystal Flores, Sandra Cano. Guests – Tanya Lenhard, Mary Jelf

Not attending: Rosa Guzman, Amy Small, Alyssa Gallegos, Maria Salas, Kelly Martinez, Danielle Swango,

The meeting was called to order at 5:10pm by Thea Gab, Policy Council chair. There were no messages on voicemail and no new notes in the Suggestion Box.

<u>Approval of Agenda and Minutes</u>: Bethany moved to approve the agenda; Crystal seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. Erin moved to approve the minutes from the regular November meeting, the January regular meeting, and the January special meeting; Bethany seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

<u>Roll Call</u>: In the secretary's absence, Mary filled in. She called roll and determined that a quorum was present according to the newly revised bylaws. Two voting members indicated they needed to leave early, so the group decided to re-order the agenda and review items needing immediate approval first.

New Business: Tanya presented Lisa Roeder for approval as the new Family and Community Partnerships Manager. Lisa has been a preschool teacher at The Center for many years and holds a BA in Human Development & Family Studies. She has also worked with the Advocates. The interview committee noted her leadership and communication skills. Chelsea moved to approve Lisa for the FCPM position; Sandra seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and on opposed. There was discussion of how Lisa will transition from her classroom to her new role with a minimum disruption for kids and families. Tanya presented Alison Kell as a new substitute teacher. She has worked for the school district in the afterschool program and does child care at a ski resort. Erin moved to approve Alison as a substitute teacher; Crystal seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed. All other new business was tabled until future meetings, to allow for higher attendance and opportunities for better discussion. Thea will put forth a request for a special meeting around the 23<sup>rd</sup> of the month to discuss items needing approval before the next regular meeting. <a href="Unfinished Business">Unfinished Business</a>: Tanya presented a revised wage scale, which is necessary due to increases in minimum wage requirements. The changes will not affect any current employees. Crystal moved to approve the new wage scale, Chelsea seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and none opposed.

All other new business was tabled until future meetings.

<u>Treasurer Report:</u> Crystal reported the balance of the Parent Activity fund to be \$1500.00, as this is the beginning of a new fiscal year. A deduction will be made for the meeting meal for this month. **Tanya called members' attention to a** display of items purchased with Parent Activity Fund money.

<u>Committee Reports:</u> Mary reported on the LCECC meeting where housing and workforce concerns were discussed. There were no other reports.

Training: Postponed to allow for discussion time of other topics.

<u>Director's Report</u>: Tanya presented the Budget Report. Fiscal Year 16 has ended all funds have been spent or encumbered. Credit card logs were also presented. She presented the Director's Report, with notes about improved attendance in January, an influx of a few mid-year applications, and the receipt of the 2017 funding letter.

<u>Announcements</u>: The announcements from the agenda were noted, including events, closures, and upcoming enrollment. The next regular Policy Council meeting scheduled for March 8 may be moved to February 9 if members approve the change.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 6:10pm by Thea.
