Required Documentation:

- Child's Birth Certificate
- Child's Immunization Record—Must be up-to-date on immunizations
- Health Insurance Card—Private Insurance, Medicaid, or CHP+
- If you wish to be considered for a Head Start preschool spot, you must include one of the following as evidence of eligibility:
 - *1040 Tax Form from 2016 or W-2 forms from 2016 or
 - *Check stubs representing one year of income
 - *Statement from Employer for one year income or
 - *Documentation of a TANF or SSI award or
 - *Documentation of foster care status

Solving Problems With Solutions

What are solutions?

Solution cards are pictures illustrating ways to solve a problem with another person. These pictures are visual cues to help children learn to productively solve issues that arise with their peers.

How does your child use this strategy?

Our preschool teachers have recently begun to present and teach your child a variety of solutions included in our "Solution Toolkit." There are ten basic solutions that we focus on: using a timer, saying please, getting a teacher, ignoring, waiting and taking turns, playing together, asking nicely, saying "please stop," sharing and trading. Our preschoolers will learn ways to deal with situations, such as sharing toys, taking turns, and playing fair by looking at the pictures, choosing a solution, and using the strategy with their friend to work it out.

For example: two children want to play with the same truck, they recognize they have a problem sharing, consult the solution pictures in the Solution Toolkit, and decide to try using a timer to work out turn taking.

Teachers facilitate the use of solutions by directly teaching children what each solution means and how to use it, practicing as a group, working individually with children to walk them through the steps to solve the problem, and acknowledging children that use solutions to productively solve problems.

How does this help support their social-emotional development?

Helping children to learn to solve their problems in a positive and productive way helps lifelong academic, personal, and social success. When children learn to solve a problem rather than react to it they are less aggressive, more cooperative, and happier in a group setting.

How can you try this at home?

Come up with some solutions to try at home. Create some pictures of these solutions for your own Solution Toolkit. Support your child with selecting and trying a solution to help them learn to solve problems with their siblings and friends at home.



A Refresher on Hand Washing Procedures at the Center

According to Colorado State Rules and Regulations for Sanitation in Childcare Settings, we practice frequent hand washing our school every day. Children wet their hands, apply soap, scrub for 20 seconds, rinse and blot dry with a paper towel. This happens whenever someone enters the classroom, during transition times from play at activity tables, before made and in the base.





Child Find

<u>Early intervention for</u> children with special needs

Every county in Colorado has professionals who are trained to evaluate children in a variety of areas, including cognitive functioning, physical functioning, hearing and vision,



Once the child find evaluation team, which includes the parents, has gathered sufficient information used to determine a child's eligibility for early intervention or preschool special education services, an Individual Family Service Plan (IFSP; birth to three years of age) or an Individual Education Plan (IEP; three to five years of age) is developed and services begin shortly.

Children under the age of six may be referred at any time for an eligibility determination for early intervention (ages birth to three) or preschool special education services (ages three through five).



Five reasons why dads should read to their children more

A new study from Harvard University in the USA reveals that children benefit more from their father reading them bedtime stories. Dads, the research revealed, spark more "imaginative discussions" and are more instrumental to their children's language development because of the way they read to their kids.

Here, in no particular order, are five reasons why all dads should take the lead.......

Dads take the stories to another level

This has been found to more than just improve language skills. When mothers read, they often focus on characters' feelings dads will link the narrative to something more pertinent to the child

Bedtime stories lead to better real life ones

The role of father involvement and its impact upon children's educational attainment showed "a positive relationship between the amounts of literacy fathers engage in for their personal use and their children's reading test." Dads who are seen to be reading a lot around the home — books, newspapers, Viz etc — send out a positive sign to their children that it's an enjoyable thing to do.

Boys especially benefit from Dad's tall tales

While the Harvard Study highlighted the positive influence dads reading has upon girls, previous research also shows how doing the bedtime read is one of the strongest forms of 'bonding' between fathers and sons.

Books build better behaved kids

Studies have also found that the time a father spends reading with his child is one of the most consistent links to that child achieving positive literacy scores throughout his or her schooling.

Children whose dads read to them regularly displayed better behavior and concentration at school, and performed better in math too.

Even in families where childcare has been disrupted by divorce or separation, the influence of dads when it came to encouraging their children to read has been found to be a key factor in the ongoing educational progress of boys especially.

Dads de-stress when reading aloud

Bedtime stories not only provide a relaxing routine for children – they can also calm adults down too. Reading is the most effective way to overcome stress. Numerous reports have shown benefits for the dads who read aloud at night – including greater skill acquisition, greater confidence and self-esteem, a better father-child relationship, and increased engagement with learning.

The Center Early Childhood Programs - Policy Council Minutes - Meeting Date March 9, 2017

<u>Attending:</u> Thea Gab, Chelsea Luna, Bethany Godsman, Erin Duggan, Kelly Martinez, Sandra Cano, and Crystal Flores. Guests – Lisa Roeder, Tanya Lenhard, Claire Oatey, & Ellie Solomon

<u>Not Attending:</u> Alyssa Gallegos, Rosa Guzman, Maria Salas, Danielle Swango, and Amy Small. The meeting was called to order at 5:25pm by Thea Gab, Policy Council chair. There were no messages on voicemail and no new notes in the Suggestion Box.

<u>Approval of Agenda and Minutes:</u> Erin moved to approve the minutes from the regular February meeting; Kelly seconded. The motion passed with all in favor and non-opposed. Chelsea moved the approval of Agenda; Sandra seconded. The motion passed all in favor and non-opposed.

Roll Call: Thea called roll and determined that a quorum was present. In the secretary's absence, Bethany Godsman filled out the minutes.

New Business: Tanya presented the Change in Scope Amendment for a Reduction to Head Start Enrollment. The three key elements of the plan were reviewed. Discussion took place in all three areas while Tanya and Claire answered any questions. Discussion included; the proposed length of preschool days, classroom quality, and support for teacher raises, and how rest time for students would be included. Claire also reviewed the budget justification and narrative section. Tanya then explained the timeline and that the Amendment will go to the School Board for approval and then the Office of Head Start. Kelly moved the approval of the Head Start Enrollment Reduction; Crystal seconded. The motion passed all in favor and non-apposed. Other new business was tabled until further meetings to allow a good discussion of the Enrollment Reduction.

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> Tanya explained the Teachers Professional Development Plan, and the 2016 – 2017 Staff Qualifications.

<u>Treasures Report:</u> Lisa reported the balance of the Parent Activity Fund. There was a deduction for the meal for the February meeting.

<u>Committee Reports:</u> Ellie reported that the School Board approved the Graduation requirements for the Lake County School District, and Lisa reported the Parent Activity Committee met and planned the March Family Fun Night.

Training: Postponed to allow for discussion time of other topics.

<u>Directors Report:</u> Tanya presented the budget reports. The credit card logs were also presented. She presented the Directors Report with attendance being better the last week of February and into March. She also let us know that our In-Kind has exceeded the required amount.

<u>Announcements:</u> The announcements from the agenda were noted, including events, closures, and enrollment updates. The next regular Policy Council meeting is scheduled for April Thursday April 13.
