It's Cold and Fly Season!

It's January, which means it is cold and flu season. Kids in preschool often get many colds due to the fact that they are explorers- with their hands and their mouths- spreading many germs just through their play. Preschoolers are still building up their immunity to colds and other diseases every day; it is simply a part of their growing process. Keeping your child healthy by giving them a lot of water, exercise, lots of rest, and healthy food, is one way to combat the cold and flu germs from getting them sick.

According to the Center for Disease Control (the CDC), the flu is spread when people cough, sneeze, or talk to others who are sick or when you touch something that has the virus on it and then touch your eyes, mouth, or nose. People can spread the virus one day before you have symptoms yourself (before you even know you are sick!) and up to 5-7 days AFTER you become sick. This means that you can come into contact with someone who may already be sick, and neither one of you knows that you have been exposed to the virus.

However, there are ways to help prevent the spread of colds and the flu. Washing your hands with soap and warm water is the best thing you can do to help. Cleaning toys and other surfaces with disinfectant if your child becomes sick will help to kill the germs. Using a tissue when you cough or sneeze and then throwing it in the trash. Try to avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth and teaching your child to do the same.

If your child becomes sick, please keep them home. Let them rest and get healthy before you bring them back to school. Remember that if your child has a fever, they are not allowed back to school until they are fever free for 24 hours without the aid of medication. This is the best way to prevent the spread of diseases within our schools.

This month would be exciting since we will be starting our study on boxes!

Why Investigate Boxes? Boxes are endlessly fascinating to young children. Perhaps more than any other toy or game, boxes have the power to hold children's attention and spark their imagination in astonishing ways. I'm sharing this article from NAEYC - Teaching Young Children, to help families get some ideas on how to support their children's learning. "With nothing more than a little imagination, boxes can be transformed into forts or houses, spaceships or submarines, castles or caves. Inside a big cardboard box, a child is transported to a world of his or her own, one where anything is possible."

Preschool Play Plans: Creativity with Cardboard

Cardboard boxes are simple, everyday items that can inspire hours of play. As children play together, they learn skills like cooperation, turn-taking, problem solving, hand-eye coordination, carrying out a plan, and much more.

Watch children as they play. This can help you figure out what they are working on and how to encourage and challenge them. Add to the play by talking about what's happening: "I see that you have crawled into that box." "That box is taller than you are!" Ask simple questions: "What else can we make out of this box?" "Do you think there is room inside the box for you and some friends?"

Building with Cardboard Boxes:

- Make a vehicle a car, plane, truck, or rocket ship out of a box. Plastic or paper plates can be the wheels.
- Build a box city. Cover smaller boxes (empty juice and cereal boxes, jewelry boxes, shoe boxes) with construction paper. Draw windows, doors, signs, and other objects found in a city.
- Add small figures of people and animals so that a box becomes a zoo, a pet store, a dog house, or an apartment building.
- Tie rope around a large box and have your child sits inside as you are pulling it. The box transforms into a wagon, sled, or carriage!
- Connect several boxes to make a train.
- Cut out head and arm holes in medium-size boxes. Children can wear the boxes and pretend to be robots!






POLICY COUNCIL
